

Council to consider additional restrictions on home-sharing

The City Council could strengthen Santa Monica's home-sharing ordinance after a five-bedroom home was converted to an Airbnb housing up to 36 people.

Councilmember Ted Winterer has asked city staff to tighten the part of the ordinance that requires home-share hosts to be permanent residents. He has also proposed limiting the number of home shares that a property owner can operate in the city and how many guests can stay in one room or dwelling.

Council will consider Winterer's request at its Tuesday meeting and if approved, staff will come back with a detailed proposal at a future meeting.

"Any time there's a disruptive technology, whether it's Airbnb or scooters or Uber and Lyft, it's always going to take local governments time to develop policies and laws that address those new technologies," Winterer said. "We took some initial stabs at regulating Airbnb, but we learned from experience that ... there are some loopholes in the original ordinance."

The city of Santa Monica passed its home-sharing ordinance in 2015. The law is meant to prevent permanent housing from being converted to vacation rentals and allows residents to host guests in their home for 30 days or less while living on-site throughout the guests' stay. It does not set a limit on the number of guests allowed, however. The local rules recently withstood a legal challenge from Airbnb and Homeaway.com.

The Daily Press reported last

month that a landmarked home at 710 Adelaide Place has been listed on Airbnb since March, when it was sold for about \$2.9 million, according to the Multiple Listing Service. The host, Ryusei "Ryan" Shimizu, is still listing the home online.

Neighbors say the home, a 1924 Pueblo Revival home known as the Zuni House, is being operated as a de facto hostel and disturbing nearby residents.

"There are people coming and going at all hours of the day and night, scooters blocking the sidewalk and cigarette butts and beer cans left on the street and sidewalk," said George Preonas, who lives down the street.

It is unclear whether Shimizu is violating any provisions of the

home-sharing ordinance as written.

He has an active business license registered to 710 Adelaide Place and states on the property's Airbnb listing that he is present in the home during guests' stays.

But he has also hosted another home in Santa Monica at 2002 20th Street through Airbnb, where he stated he is present while hosting guests. The business license at that address is registered to Chisato Tanabe.

The Adelaide Place and 20th Street properties are also listed on another website, relaxtay.com. The website also lists several apartments in Los Angeles as short-term rentals.

Neighbors of 710 Adelaide Place say the owners of the property live

New hydrogels show promise in treating bone defects

Bioengineers and dentists from the UCLA School of Dentistry have developed a new hydrogel that is more porous and effective in promoting tissue repair and regeneration compared to hydrogels that are currently available. Once injected in a mouse model, the new hydrogel is shown to induce migration of naturally occurring stem cells to better promote bone healing. Current experimental applications using hydrogels and stem cells introduced into the body or expensive biological agents can come with negative side effects.

The findings, published online in the journal *Nature Communications*, suggest that in the near future the next generation of hydrogel systems could greatly improve current biomaterial-based therapeutics to repair bone defects.

Hydrogels are biomaterials that are made up of a 3D network of polymer chains. Due to the network's ability to absorb water and its structural similarities to living tissue, it can be used to deliver cells to defective areas to regenerate lost tissue. However, the small pore size of hydrogels limits the survival of transplanted cells, their expansion and new tissue formation, making this less than ideal for regenerating tissue.

One material that has caught on in the field of biomaterials is the naturally occurring mineral, clay. Clay has become an ideal additive to medical products with no reported negative effects. It has been shown to be biocompatible and is readily available.

The clay is structured in layers, with the surface having a negative charge. The unique layered structure and charge were important to researchers as their hydrogels had a positive or opposite charge. When the hydrogel was inserted into the clay layers, through a process called intercalation chemistry, the end result was a clay-enhanced hydrogel with a much more porous structure that could better facilitate bone formation.

Once they had their clay-enhanced hydrogel, the researchers used a process called photo-induction, or the introduction of light, to turn their new biomaterial into a gel, which would make it easier to be injected into their mouse model.

The mouse model had a non-healing skull defect, which the researchers injected with their clay-enhanced hydrogel. After six weeks, they found that the model showed significant bone healing through its own naturally occurring stem cell migration and growth.

"This research will help us develop the next generation of hydrogel systems with high porosity and could greatly improve current bone graft materials," said lead author Min Lee, professor of biomaterials science at the UCLA School of Dentistry and a member of the Jonsson Comprehensive Cancer Center. "Our nanocomposite hydrogel system will be useful for many applications, including therapeutic delivery, cell carriers and tissue engineering."

Injectable combinations of living cells and bioactive molecules using hydrogels would be a preferred medical application to treat unhealthy or damaged areas of the body rather than more invasive surgery.

Future research is planned to learn how the physical properties of nanocomposite hydrogels affect the migration of cells and their function, as well as the formation of blood vessels.

Other authors of the study are co-first author Zhong-Kai Cui, an assistant professor of cell biology at Southern Medical University in China; and Dr. Benjamin Wu, Dr. Tara Aghaloo, Jessalyn Baljon and Soyon Kim, all of UCLA.

The study was funded by the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research, the National Institute of Arthritis and Musculoskeletal and Skin Diseases, the U.S. Department of Defense and MTF Biologics. The authors have no conflicting interests.

Planetarium Explains Solstices, Telescope Buying, & More

The Santa Monica College (SMC) John Drescher Planetarium has unveiled its schedule of fall 2019 feature shows and special telescope-viewing sessions. The season's shows include several presenting a 50-year retrospective on the flights of Apollo, and instructions on the best ways to use binoculars to enjoy the night sky.

The feature shows are at 8 p.m. and are preceded by "The Night Sky Show" at 7 p.m. with the latest news in astronomy and space exploration, a family-friendly "tour" of the constellations, and the chance to ask astronomy-related questions.

The fall 2019 lineup is:

- September 6: Special Observing Event: "First-Quarter Moon, Jupiter, and Saturn" – A look through various telescopes at the Moon and its craters, "seas," and mountains, followed by a look at Jupiter's cloud bands and major moons, and the lovely, unreal-looking rings of Saturn. If clouds intervene, the program will stay in the planetarium with high-resolution images.

- September 13: Backyard Observing: "Binocular Highlights of the Autumn Sky" – How to use binoculars to enjoy the highlights of the autumn sky, how to get oriented in the skies of Southern California, what the numbers printed on binoculars mean, and more. If weather permits, the program will move outdoors for a look through binoculars, and guests are invited to bring along their own binoculars.

- September 20: "TILT! Equinoxes and Solstices Explained" – Most city dwellers are only vaguely aware of what the equinoxes and solstices actually are. The Digistar planetarium projector and other imagery will be used to try to remedy this disconnect from the natural world – and dispel some myths, like that egg story....

- September 27 & October 11: "NASA's Orion Crew Vehicle: The Long and Winding Road" – Designed originally to be a general-purpose successor to the Space Shuttle, Crew Exploration Vehicle Orion has evolved through various design incarnations to emerge as a dedicated deep space vehicle for a crew of four, with a possible first flight in late 2020 or soon after.

- October 4: Special Observing Event: "A Crescent Moon, Saturn, and a Pretty Double Star"

- A look through various telescopes at a fat 6-day-old crescent Moon and the always beautiful Saturn, as well as the pretty multicolored double star Albireo, riding high overhead in Cygnus, the Swan. If clouds intervene, the program will stay in the planetarium with high-resolution images.

- October 18 & 25: 50-Year Retrospective: The Flights of Apollo: "Ranger, Surveyor, and Lunar Orbiter - Scouting the Moon" – As NASA prepared for the first lunar landings, the Ranger, Surveyor, and Lunar Orbiter programs came and went quickly, but hugely increased our knowledge of the Moon, like whether the lunar dust would be able to support the weight of a crewed spacecraft.

- November 1: "Holiday Telescope Buyer Survival Guide" – Anyone considering giving a telescope as a holiday gift will face a bewildering array of choices and a whole new jargon. This program – presented in time to shop before the good suppliers sell out of the best starter instruments – will demystify the world of telescopes and provide some concrete examples and recommendations for first-time telescope shoppers.

- November 8: Special Observing Event: "A Gibbous Moon, the Ring Nebula, and a Pretty Double Star!" – A look through a variety of telescopes at a fat 12-day old gibbous Moon and its Copernicus crater and Mare Imbrium, as well as a look at the Ring Nebula and the pretty multicolored double star Albireo, the "head" of Cygnus the Swan. If clouds intervene, the program will stay in the planetarium with high-resolution images.

- November 15 & 22: 50-Year Retrospective: The Flights of Apollo: "Apollo 12 50 Years On - The Essential Mission" – If Apollo was to provide good science, precision landing was paramount. Apollo 12, commanded by Pete Conrad, was targeted to land in the Ocean of Storms, within walking distance of the Surveyor 3 probe. The show revisits this essential mission.

- December 6 & 13: "A Winter's Solstice" – As the holiday season approaches, this feature show discusses the history of ancient observances of the Winter Solstice, and takes a look at a re-creation of the remarkable planetary conjunction in 2 BCE – a leading candidate for a scientific explanation of the Star of Bethlehem.

The John Drescher Planetarium, which features a Digistar projection system, is located near the elevators on the second floor of Drescher Hall (1900 Pico Blvd., Santa Monica). Tickets are available at the door and cost \$11 (\$9 seniors and children) for the evening's scheduled "double bill," or \$6 (\$5 seniors age 60+ and children age 12 and under) for a single show or telescope-viewing session.

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Earth Talk

DEAR EARTHTALK: I'M GOING INTO MY SENIOR YEAR IN HIGH SCHOOL AND AM LOOKING FOR A COLLEGE FOCUSED ON SUSTAINABILITY WHERE I CAN MAJOR IN ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES. ANY IDEAS? – MIKE MITCHELL, OAKLAND, CA

Depending on how deeply you want to go into environmental studies, there are many colleges that could meet your green-minded learning needs. A great place to begin research is the Princeton Review's annual "Guide to 399 Green Colleges." The 9th annual version was released late last year and ranked the College of the Atlantic (COA) in Bar Harbor, Maine as the nation's greenest institution of higher learning. Completing the Top 15, in rank order: SUNY Syracuse, University of Vermont (UVM), Dickinson College, St. Mary's College of Maryland, Colorado State, Pitzer, Cornell, Randolph College, Stanford, UC Davis, Seattle University, Santa Clara University, American University and Goucher College.

In general, colleges made the top of the list if sustainability factored prominently in their academic offerings, campus policies, initiatives, activities and career preparation for students. Princeton Review tallied data from survey responses submitted by administrators at 648 different colleges during the 2017-2018 school year. Several of the survey questions drill down on the given school's sustainability-related policies, practices and programs, weighting 25+ data points to create a "Green Rating" score on a scale of 60 to 99 for each college surveyed, with 399 colleges qualifying as "green" with overall scores of 80+.

It's no surprise that COA, established in 1969 as the first American college to focus primarily on the relationship between humans and the environment, has topped the list for three years running. With only 350 students and 35 faculty members, small

classes and focused learning are the norm at COA, which has been churning out environmental leaders for five decades. It became the first carbon-neutral college in 2007 and plans to be completely rid of fossil fuels on campus by 2030.

At the #2 school on the "green colleges" list, SUNY Syracuse's College of Environmental Science and Forestry, students and faculty work together on developing innovative solutions to environmental challenges and can focus on applying what they learn in internships reserved for them with the New York Department of Environmental Conservation.

Next on the list, UVM has incorporated sustainability into campus policies and curricula for decades, but has recently shown renewed leadership with its Sustainable Entrepreneurship program and campus-wide commitment to waste reduction and energy conservation. UVM has been sourcing all of its energy from renewables since 2015, with solar panels all over campus to make the most of the fleeting Vermont sun.

Some other schools with excellent environmental studies and science programs include Antioch, Reed, Middlebury, Colby, Colorado College, Montana State, Evergreen State, Pomona, and the universities of Idaho, Michigan, Montana, North Carolina, Texas, Washington and Wisconsin. In fact, today it might be harder to find a school with no regard for sustainability than otherwise, so you should find a college where you feel at home on campus and then make sure the academic programs line up with your own green perspective.

in Texas. The house rents for \$16,000 a month, according to the Multiple Listing Service.

City spokesperson Constance Farrell said the city approved a home-sharing application for 710 Adelaide Place that indicated the property could host a maximum of 16 overnight guests. The Code Enforcement Division is investigating multiple complaints that neighbors have made regarding the use of the property, she said.

Winterer said that the home-sharing ordinance is designed to allow residents to earn extra income by hosting travelers in their homes without disrupting neighborhood

character.

"We want to provide these opportunities for our residents, but not at the expense of neighborhood peace and quiet," he said. "I think our legal staff is prepared to come back to the council with some changes to the ordinance."

The city of Los Angeles' home-sharing ordinance, which the City Council adopted last December, only allows hosts to book one listing at a time. Preonas said that provision alone would prevent hosts like Shimizu from hosting dozens of people in one house.

"If you can only book one listing at a time, you won't have 36 people sleeping in bunk beds," Preonas said.

Monica before receiving a bachelor's degree from Bennington College. He then received a doctorate in music at the Peabody Institute and worked as the director of orchestras at the University of Delaware.

Hogan said Stone's personal connection to Santa Monica made him singularly invested in the symphony. He went out of his way to mentor orchestra members and recruit more Santa Monica residents to join the symphony, she said.

"In his mind, this is his community, not just an orchestra," Hogan said.

Orchestra members have circulated a petition online to reinstate Stone that has received 298 signatures, which they presented at an SMC board of trustees meeting in July.

Robin Ramsdell, an SMC counselor, wrote on the petition that Stone has been dedicated to growing the orchestra and helping its members succeed.

"He is very passionate about the work he is doing, and he works tirelessly to put together programs that will be interesting for his orchestra members as well as his audiences," Ramsdell said.

Tim Battig, the symphony's principal horn player, said the orchestra has received no clarity on why the music department and the vice president of academic affairs did not renew his contract.

Battig said he believes the decision was driven by an orchestra member's personal animosity against Stone. That member advocated for his firing to the music department chair, he said.

"What happened was definitely a power struggle," he said.

Battig said he intends to leave the symphony after 35 years in protest of Stone's termination.

"I'll lose some income, but I have to take a stand here because of how this situation with (Stone) took place," he said.

Stone declined to comment on his contract but said he greatly enjoyed working with the orchestra and its members.

"We were on an outstanding trajectory and I was very proud to be onstage with them," he said. "I'll really miss the music department and I hope I'll get to return someday."

SMC spokesperson Grace Smith said the college cannot comment on reasons for any hiring-related decisions.

"SMC recognizes the value and contributions that community members make to the longstanding orchestra program," Smith said. "We look forward to continuing the tradition of collaboration between the college and local community in support of our mutual treasure, the SMC Symphony Orchestra."

Elizabeth Stoyanovich, who previously directed the orchestra at Pacific Palisades Charter High School, will conduct the symphony this fall, Smith said.






