Whitey Bulger, Boston gangster, found slain in prison at 89

James "Whitey" Bulger, the murderous Boston gangster who benefited from a corrupt relationship with the FBI before spending 16 years as one of America's most wanted men, was slain in federal prison. He was 89.

Bulger was found unresponsive Tuesday morning at the U.S. penitentiary in West Virginia where he'd just been transferred, and a medical examiner declared him dead shortly afterward, according to the Federal Bureau of Prisons. Authorities did not immediately release a cause of death, but Justin Tarovsky, a prison union official, told The Associated Press it was being investigated as a homicide.

Bulger, the model for Jack Nicholson's ruthless crime boss in the 2006 Martin Scorsese movie, "The Departed," led a largely Irish mob that ran loan-sharking, gambling and drug rackets. He also was an FBI informant who ratted on the New England mob, his gang's main rival, in an era when bringing down the Mafia was a top national priority for the FBI.

Bulger's rap sheet started as a juvenile, and he spent three years in Alcatraz, the infamous island prison off San Francisco.

Bulger fled Boston in late 1994 after his FBI handler, John Connolly Jr., warned him he was about to be indicted. With a \$2 million reward on his head, Bulger became one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted" criminals, with a place just below Osama bin Laden.

There was no love lost for Bulger on the Boston streets he once ruled.

Accommodations available for voters with kids

Parents take their young children to school every day, but they might not know they can bring them along when their schools become polling places on Election Day.

Studies show that among the 6.2 million eligible voters in Los Angeles County, parents of young children is one of the demographics with low voter turnout, according to First 5 LA, a public early childhood advocacy organization. Researchers say parents of young children often forgo voting because of obstacles to finding childcare or the difficulty of managing a child's behavior in long

lines at polling places.

But what some California parents may not know is that state law allows them to bring their under-18 children to the polling place and into the voting booth.

First 5 LA is trying to raise awareness about voting accommodations that can benefit parents, such as voting by mail or surrendering their early ballot at the polling place to avoid long lines. The organization is also publicizing the free rides available from Metro and Lyft on Election Day as a resource for parents.

"It's a wonderful example parents can provide for their

Tesla's Musk buys about \$10M in company stock

Tesla CEO Elon Musk has added nearly \$10 million worth of company stock to his portfolio. Musk's trust bought nearly 30,000 shares on the open market Monday. The purchases were disclosed in a filing Tuesday with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission.

The filing says Musk will buy another \$20 million worth of stock in a transaction with the automaker that should close by next week.

Musk disclosed the \$20 million purchase in an Oct. 16 filing about court approval of a deal to settle an SEC fraud case. The case involved tweets by Musk saying he had secured funding to take the company private when the deal wasn't final. Tesla and Musk each agreed to pay \$20 million in penalties.

Musk now owns about 20 percent of Tesla.

US scholar awarded \$1 million Berggruen Prize for philosophy

U.S. philosopher and scholar Martha Nussbaum is the winner of this year's \$1 million Berggruen Prize for philosophy and culture.

The award was announced Tuesday by the Los Angeles-based Berggruen Institute, which hailed Nussbaum's work as transcending academia in helping a nation and world to understand and overcome divisiveness.

Nussbaum, author of more than 20 books, frequently examines emotions and the role they play in moral and political judgments.

Her most recent work, "The Monarchy of Fear," ascribes much of the nation's current divisiveness to a politics of blame and fear.

The Berggruen Prize was established in 2016 by philanthropist Nicolas Berggruen to honor those who have "profoundly shaped human self-understanding and advancement."

Nussbaum, who teaches law and ethics at the University of Chicago, is the first American recipient.

Audit: California paid \$4B in questionable Medi-Cal claims

California paid at least \$4 billion over four years in questionable Medi-Cal premiums and claims because it failed to follow up on eligibility discrepancies, according to an audit released Tuesday.

From 2014 through 2017, more than 450,000 people marked as eligible for Medi-Cal in the state's system were listed as ineligible in county systems, the California auditor's office said. Half of those discrepancies persisted for more than two years.

"Some eligible individuals may have encountered unnecessary hardship and been inappropriately denied services," said a summary that accompanied the report.

An email seeking comment from the Department of Health Care Services, which administers California's Medicaid program, was not immediately returned.

At least 170,000 people were listed as able to receive benefits after their temporary eligibility statuses had expired, "which may amass significant costs to the state," the summary said. Some residents received temporary benefits for more than three years after their eligibility ran out, the report found.

Auditors recommended the department recover erroneous payments when possible and "implement protocols to ensure timely resolution of discrepancies."

The department was also urged to assist counties in addressing the problems.

More than 13 million Californians are enrolled in Medi-Cal, which provides low-income residents with services including general health care, emergency services, dental work and mental health and substance abuse treatments.

1,000 brooding octopuses found off California coast

Scientists exploring the sea floor off the coast of central California found more than 1,000 octopuses tucked between rocks with their tentacles inverted and covering clusters of white eggs—a pose common among brooding females.

Ocean Exploration Trust biologists made the discovery last week nearly 2 miles (3 kilometers) below the surface off the coast of Monterey.

The cluster of octopuses glowing in the dark was captured on Oct. 23 by a submersible's camera during the first dive of the Nautilus, a vessel exploring the Davidson Seamount in NOAA's Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary.

Researchers say this kind of aggregation of deep-sea octopuses has been reported only once before, when a smaller group of about 100 were spotted brooding eggs in the ocean off Costa Rica.

Pasadena suspicious object was container for hiding drugs

An investigation of a Southern California bomb scare took an unusual turn with an arrest for misdemeanor drug violations.

The arrest stemmed from a suspicious object found on a U-Haul truck in Pasadena Monday evening. A bomb squad was summoned, the area was evacuated and traffic was halted at the north end of State Route 110 and on a Metro commuter Line.

The object turned out to be an empty cylindrical plastic container affixed to the truck by magnets.

Pasadena police say the investigation led to Theodore Bancarz, who returned the truck to U-Haul.

Police say Bancarz told investigators he used the container to hide drugs and paraphernalia while driving. Police say a similar container with drugs and paraphernalia was found in his Glendale home.

SMC Student and Campus Leaders Hold Interfaith Prayer Vigil for Pittsburgh Synagogue Massacre Victims

The Associated Students (AS) of Santa Monica College (SMC) along with the SMC Chabad Club and the SMC Office of Student Life organized an interfaith prayer vigil and service honoring the memory of the 11 people who were gunned down at Pittsburgh's Tree of Life synagogue on Saturday, October 27. Roughly 200 SMC students and employees gathered in the SMC main campus quad for the impromptu event held at 12 noon on Tuesday, Oct. 30.

Rabbi Eli Levitansky of Chabad of Santa Monica; the Rev. Eric Shafer, Senior Pastor at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church in Santa Monica; SMC student Mustafa Abdulla Seth of the Muslim Student Association; and Ira Roohani of the Santa Monica Baha'i Center participated, sharing messages of solidarity—derived mostly from the scripture of their respective faiths—against hate, and speaking of love, comfort and peace.

AS President Isabel Rodriguez read out the names of the Pittsburgh synagogue shooting victims and led the crowd in a moment of silence. She stated that the service also honored the memory of the two victims who lost their lives in a Kroger grocery store shooting in Jefferson, Kentucky on Oct. 24.

Rabbi Levitansky led the student and campus leaders in a ceremonial lighting of candles in memory of the victims. SMC Superintendent/President Dr. Kathryn E. Jeffery shared with the audience a message she had sent to friends and colleagues in the wake of the news.

"I was stunned that, yet again, another community had been targeted by . . . another senseless act of hatred, bigotry, and careless disregard for human life," she said. "I am saddened that you are touched in any way by this act of hate and violence . . . we have so much work to do to bridge divides of all kinds. However, I am convinced [that] the task, though daunting, is doable. We are together in this world we share. Some of us like that fact more than others. May we all be protected and guided safely on our journey forward. We still have so much good to accomplish."

After the service, many of those present pinned messages on a "Wall of Goodness and Kindness", which spoke of an intention to spread light through ways such as an act of kindness and the lighting of Shabbat candles. Santa Monica College is a California Community College accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC).

Editor:

Former Mayor Michael Feinstein's argument against Measure TL—the citizens' initiative for City Council Term Limits—asks voters to imagine what might happen in a hypothetical scenario.

somewhere in the U.S. mail system.

What's more, an official tells The Associated Press that the man suspected of sending the bombs kept a list of elected officials and others who investigators believe were intended targets.

The disclosure of the list came as 56-year-old Cesar Sayoc made his initial court appearance in Miami federal court Monday, and after bomb squads were called to a post office in Atlanta about a suspicious mailing to CNN that was similar to the pipe bomb packages recovered last week.

The official said authorities had recovered soldering equipment, a printer, and stamps similar to those used on the package bombs after arresting Sayoc last week in Florida. Authorities believe he was putting explosives together in his van.

The official also said authorities have been scrutinizing Sayoc's social media posts. The official wasn't authorized to discuss the ongoing investigation and spoke on condition of anonymity to the AP.

The FBI said via its Twitter account that the recovered package in Atlanta was "similar in appearance" to the bubble-wrapped manila envelopes authorities say were sent by Sayoc to intended targets from Delaware to California, including former President Barack Obama, former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton and former Vice President Joe Biden.

CNN President Jeff Zucker says all mail to CNN has been screened offsite since last week, when a series of package bombs began appearing around the country. Among them were two apparent mail bombs sent to CNN.

At least some listed a return address of U.S. Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz, former chair of the Democratic National Committee.

She represents the South Florida district where the former male stripper, pizza

driver and strip club DJ lived in an old van covered with bumper stickers praising Trump, disparaging Democrats and CNN, and showing rifle crosshairs over liberals including Clinton, commentator Van Jones and filmmaker Michael Moore.

Sayoc was arrested Friday outside a South Florida auto parts store after investigators said they identified him through fingerprint and DNA evidence. He faces more than 50 years in prison if convicted on all charges. None of the bombs exploded and no one was injured.

At Monday's hearing, federal prosecutors said they will seek to keep Sayoc jailed until trial as a flight risk and a danger to the community. A judge set another hearing for Friday on whether to grant bail to Sayoc and to discuss when he will be sent from Miami to New York, where five federal charges were filed.

Shackled at the wrists and ankles in a tan jail jumpsuit, Sayoc became weepy at one point, but said little at the hearing.

Defense attorney Daniel Aaronson urged people not to rush to judgment.

"Right now, we know very, very, very little," Aaronson said. "We do not know all the evidence the government has. You have to keep in mind he has not been found guilty of anything."

The FBI said it believes the package intended for CNN headquarters in Atlanta that was discovered Monday is similar to those that Sayoc is accused of sending. Law enforcement officials have said they believe the packages were staggered and more could be discovered.

The New York Times said in a staff memo that it was notified by the FBI on Monday that one of its editors was on a list of potential targets of the mail-bomb suspect. Later that day, an envelope addressed to the editor raised concerns, but New York police determined that it was a false alarm. The editor was not identified.

children," said First 5 LA representative Gabriel Sanchez. "When those children grow up, they will become voters themselves."

The Santa Monica Malibu Unified School District has encouraged parents to register through its PTA groups, a spokesperson said. Franklin, Roosevelt, and Grant elementary schools will all serve as polling places, as will most of the city's parks and the Montana Branch Library.

"When parents start to understand how schools are funded in California, it sparks an interest in voting," said former SMMUSD PTA council president Jennifer Smith.

Brittany Poulton, a mother of three year old and six month old daughters, brought her youngest daughter to her polling place in June for the primary election when she was just ten days old.

"You don't have to feel like you're causing a nuisance or being inconvenient (for

bringing your kids) ... you don't have to arrange childcare to vote," she said. "The people working the polls are always friendly and willing to give an "I Voted" sticker to kids."

In the 2020 elections, however, the number of polling places in Los Angeles County will drop by 75 percent as the county makes changes in alignment with the 2016 California Voter's Choice Act, which calls for many polling places to be replaced by voting centers.

Voters will be able to vote or drop off mail-in ballots at any County center for 11 days, which could make it easier for parents of young children to cast their ballots. Center workers will also help residents register to vote.

The County will hold community meetings and solicit feedback online to decide where to place voting centers.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA MONICA

The following is a summary of Ordinance Number 2589 (CCS) prepared by the Office of the City Attorney:

Ordinance Number 2589 (CCS) ("the Ordinance")

The Ordinance creates Santa Monica Municipal Code Section 10.08.565 and establishes a 15-ton vehicle gross weight limit on the Santa Monica Pier Bridge. Under the Ordinance, a vehicle may be exempt from the gross weight limit if issued a community events permit.

Patricia Donahue's husband, Michael, was killed in 1982 when he offered a ride home to a man allegedly targeted for death by Bulger because he was talking to the FBI. "I'd like to open up a champagne bottle and celebrate," she told WBZ-TV on Tuesday.

Tom Duffy, a retired state police detective who searched for Bulger and was a consultant on "The Departed," called word of Bulger's death "celebratory news."

When the extent of his crimes and the FBI's role in overlooking them became public in the late 1990s, Bulger became a source of embarrassment for the FBI. During the years he was a fugitive, the FBI battled a public perception that it had not tried very hard to find him.

After more than 16 years on the run, Bulger was captured at age 81 in Santa Monica, California, where he had been living in a rent-controlled apartment near the beach with his longtime girlfriend, Catherine Greig.

In 2013, he was convicted in the slayings, as well as extortion, and money-laundering after a sensational racketeering trial that included graphic testimony from three former Bulger cohorts: a hit man, a protege and a partner. He was sentenced nearly five years ago to two consecutive life sentences plus five years.

Bulger had just been moved to USP Hazelton, a high-security prison with an adjacent minimum security satellite camp in Bruceton Mills, West Virginia. He had been in a prison in Florida before a stopover at a transfer facility in Oklahoma City. Federal Bureau of Prisons officials and his attorney had declined to comment on why he was being moved.

A lawyer who represented Bulger blamed the gangster's death on decisions made by the Bureau of Prisons.

"He was sentenced to life in prison, but as a result of decisions by the Federal Bureau of Prisons, that sentence has been changed to the death penalty," attorney J.W. Carney Jr. said in a statement.

Bulger, nicknamed "Whitey" for his bright platinum hair, grew up in a gritty South Boston housing project and became known as one of the most ruthless gangsters in Boston. His younger brother, William Bulger, became one of the most powerful politicians in Massachusetts, leading the

state Senate for 17 years.

In working-class "Southie," Bulger was known for helping old ladies across the street and giving turkey dinners to his neighbors at Thanksgiving. He had a kind of Robin Hood-like image among some locals, but authorities said he would put a bullet in the brain of anyone who he even suspected of double-crossing him.

"You could go back in the annals of criminal history and you'd be hard-pressed to find anyone as diabolical as Bulger," said Duffy.

"Killing people was his first option. They don't get any colder than him," Duffy said after Bulger was finally captured in June 2011.

Bulger was accused of strangling Debra Davis, the 26-year-old girlfriend of his partner, Stephen "The Rifleman" Flemmi, and Deborah Hussey, also 26, the daughter of Flemmi's common-law wife. In both cases, Bulger insisted on pulling out the women's teeth so they would be difficult to identify, Flemmi testified.

During a search of his Santa Monica apartment, agents found over \$800,000 in cash and more than 30 guns, many hidden in holes in the walls. A property manager at the building said Bulger and Greig, who used the names Charles and Carol Gasko, had lived there for 15 years and always paid the rent-controlled rate of \$1,145 a month in cash.

They were caught days after the FBI began a new publicity campaign focusing on Greig. The daytime TV announcements showed photos of Greig and noted that she was known to frequent beauty salons and have her teeth cleaned once a month.

A woman from Iceland who knew Bulger and Greig in Santa Monica saw a report on CNN about the latest publicity campaign and called in the tip that led agents to them. The Boston Globe identified the tipster as a former Miss Iceland, a former actress who starred in Noxzema shaving cream commercials in the 1970s.

Greig is still serving her sentence at a federal prison in Minnesota.

Bulger, a physical fitness buff, had been taken to a Boston hospital from his jail cell at least three times, complaining of chest pains, since being brought back to Boston to stand trial.

Schools into one campus as well as create a separate middle school.

The alignment will also separate Malibu Middle School from Malibu High School, placing the middle school on the soon to be vacant Juan Cabrillo campus. This will give MMS more operating freedom as well as free up space for the reimagined MHS.

According to a staff report, superintendent Dr. Ben Drati and Malibu community members support moving forward with the alignment project this year with operations at the sites to begin at the start of the 2019-2020 school year.

District staff believes combining Juan Cabrillo and Point Dume into one campus would be beneficial for many reasons, such as better serving the schools for inquiry and project-based learning and increasing engagement among teachers and students while reducing expenditures of running two small schools (both schools operate with around 200 students).

A staff report says that over time, hopes are that the new combined elementary school campus and Malibu's other elementary school, Webster, will balance their enrollments.

Additionally, hopes are that the alignment will give Malibu's schools more autonomy and identity as well as result in savings due to combining services and staff.

In the alignment, middle school students (Grades 6-8) from MMS would be moved into Juan Cabrillo while elementary students (Grades K-5) from Juan Cabrillo would be moved to Point Dume. The move would work in two phases, one temporary and one permanent.

The temporary phase would install ten portable rooms (7 Classrooms [24' x 40'], 1 Kindergarten [36' x 40'], 1 Administration [36' x 40'], and 1 Restroom [12' x 40']) to the existing Point Dume Elementary School grounds for operations at the start of the 2019-20 school year.

The permanent phase would replace the portables with two permanent buildings (depending on funding), a two-story Classroom Building and a single-story Administration Building.

Attendance boundaries for schools in Malibu would change due to the consolidation: Point Dume's boundaries would need to be expanded to include all of Juan Cabrillo's existing attendance boundaries. Additionally, Juan Cabrillo's boundaries would be changed to the entirety of Malibu for middle school students.

The district also surveyed the environmental impact of the project, choosing urban planning team PlaceWorks to perform an environmental review before any work begins. PlaceWorks found that the alignment project could cause significant environmental impacts which could be decreased significantly with certain mitigation measures. In a public hearing to discuss mitigation measures and the alignment, no comments were received in regards to the environmental impacts or mitigation measures.

Public opinion was overwhelmingly positive for the alignment and Malibu High reimagining at a May 3 board meeting. Many Malibu public speakers and residents praised superintendent Dr. Drati and board member Craig Foster.

One resident added, "[Malibu] haven't felt listened to like this since Neil Schmidt."






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
