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Plans to develop nightmare building passed at ARB

A vacant apartment building in Mid-City that has stood boarded up and surrounded by construction fencing for 18 years is finally getting a makeover.

The Architectural Review Board approved plans to construct a two-story, four-unit multi-family building at 3004 Broadway at its meeting Nov. 5, with board member Kevin Daly calling the existing building the city's last "haunted house." The building was damaged in the 1994 Northridge Earthquake and received a reconstruction permit in 1997, but the project was not completed before the permit expired three years later.

The corner of Broadway and Stanford will soon be unrecognizable. The facade of the new building will alternate between light beige and gray and vary in depth. Metal balconies and decks on the roof and carport will be visible from the street.

nearby Some have raised concerns about the decks infringing on the privacy of neighbors. After a Sept. 13 community meeting, applicant Nathan Sewell relocated the roof decks away from a building adjoining the southern edge of the property and reduced the size of

Challenger Morena beats incumbent O'Connor for City Council

Pam O'Connor lost her bid for a seventh term on the City Council last night becoming just the third incumbent in the City's history to be voted out of office. However, a possible appointment could reinstate her for two years.

Voters chose businessman Greg Morena who was making his first run for elected office alongside incumbents Sue Himmelrich and

"We're a very politically active community and it's an incredible show of how important government is to our community," said Morena of beating an incumbent. "There's a great history of progressive thought that began in Santa Monica and I'm proud and honored to be a part of that legacy. It gives me hope that you can live here, grow up here, get involved, stay involved, and be a part of the change that will keep this city great and make it better."

O'Connor relied on her more than 20 years of experience for her reelection campaign. She didn't receive some of the endorsements traditionally necessary to secure victory in Santa Monica, she was out spent by most of her opponents and she ran a campaign that seemed based on riding the power of incumbency back to the council dais.

She has been credited with helping to bring the Expo Line

to Santa Monica but O'Connor has been increasingly at odds with some sections of the city over her perceived support for development. This was the first election to be held since she was involved in a scandal at City Hall over the improper firing of a newly hired employee. The city was sued over the case and ultimately hired a consultant who recommended several changes to the city's

An issue in the Westside and Los Angeles at-large is causing high concern amongst some residents and county officials. To be blunt, the issue is marijuana.





Man sentenced for smashing Trump's Hollywood star with ax

A man who smashed Donald Trump's star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame has been sentenced to three years' probation after pleading no contest to a felony count of vandalism.

City News Service reports a judge also sentenced Austin Mikel Clay on Wednesday to attend psychological counseling and pay more than \$9,400 to the Hollywood Chamber of Commerce. He must also perform community service.

Clay took a pickax to Trump's star on Hollywood Boulevard in July. The star recognizes Trump for his work on the TV show "The Apprentice." It was quickly repaired.

After he pleaded not guilty in August, Clay told reporters the vandalism was a "rightful and just act." He said he wanted to "bring about positive political change" and didn't believe prosecutors should have charged him.

Smartphone makers bet on foldable screens as next big thing

The smartphone industry has been searching for a breakthrough to revive a market mired in an innovation lull and a sales slump. There's now a potential catalyst on the horizon.

Samsung and several rivals are preparing to roll out new redesigned devices with flexible screens that can be folded in half without breaking. That feat could make the devices more versatile for work and pleasure, by increasing screen space to the size of a mini-tablet and fold like a wallet so they can revert to the size of regular phones.

"Everyone has been thinking about the same question: 'What's next? Is there nothing more from a smartphone?'" said Bill Liu, CEO of Royale Corp., a small Silicon Valley company that unveiled a foldable-screen phone last week in China, where it will go on sale next month.

The concept of foldable-screen phones is about to get much broader exposure now that Samsung appears finally ready to release one. In an indication of how difficult it is to make a flexible screen that's also durable, Samsung first announced its plans to build a folding-screen phone five years ago.

It wasn't until Wednesday, though, that Samsung finally provided a glimpse at what it's been working on.

"We have been living in a world where the size of a screen could only be as large as the device itself," said Justin Denison, Samsung's senior vice president of mobile product marketing. "We have just entered a new dimension."

Except for a fleeting look at a device he held in a hand, Denison provided scant information about the phone. Samsung says it will be ready to hit the market at some point next year.

It's not even clear whether flexible-screen phones will have mass appeal, especially when the bendy devices are expected to cost more than \$1,000. Royole, for instance, has expects to sell its foldable-screen phone – the FlexPai – for \$1,300 to \$1,500 once it comes to the U.S. – something that won't happen until next year, at the earliest.

Motorist found shot to death on LA freeway onramp

Los Angeles police say a man found dead in the driver's seat of a vehicle on a freeway onramp was the victim of a car-to-car shooting.

Officials say the victim was discovered with a gunshot wound early Wednesday along westbound Interstate 10 in the Boyle Heights neighborhood.

The victim was only described as a man in his 50s who was behind the wheel of a Toyota Corolla. A motive for the shooting was unknown, and no suspect or vehicle description was available.

40 arrested in human smuggling investigation in California

Federal authorities say 40 people in the U.S. illegally were arrested after investigators found two separate apartments used in a suspected human smuggling operation in Southern California.

Officials say U.S. Border Patrol agents raided an apartment in the city of Imperial Beach on Monday and discovered 22 Mexican nationals. After further investigation the agents found 18 additional people from Mexico at another unit in the same apartment complex.

A statement says 36 males, ages 16 to 49, and four females, ages 24 to 46, are in custody. The investigation is ongoing.

California braces for extreme fire conditions

The National Weather Service has issued a red flag warnings in much of Southern California and Northern California.

Meteorologists say a strong Santa Ana wind event is expected to begin Thursday morning and continue through Friday evening across a huge swath of Southern California, from just east of San Diego to just outside Santa Barbara.

Peak winds are expected Thursday night, with the potential for gusts up to 50 mph in valleys and coasts, and up to 70 mph in the mountains.

In combination with low humidity and temperatures in the 80s, that makes for extreme fire danger. In Northern California, Pacific Gas and Electric Company notified about 70,000 customers it may turn off power in portions of nine counties, including Napa and Sonoma, because of red flag conditions.

Man charged in deadly LA store standoff expected in court

A man accused of shooting at police before taking hostages during a deadly standoff at a Los Angeles grocery in July is expected in court Wednesday.

An arraignment is set in Los Angeles County Superior Court for Gene Evin Atkins. The 28-year-old is charged with murder in the death of a Trader Joe's store employee who was hit by an officer's bullet during a police gun battle with Atkins.

Atkins also is charged with kidnapping and carjacking.

Police say Atkins shot his grandmother and kidnapped his girlfriend before leading officers on a chase that ended with a crash outside the Trader Joe's.

Los Angeles police Chief Michel Moore has defended the decision to use deadly force as an attempt to stop what officers feared could become a mass shooting.

You Can Get Anything You Want

THIS WEEK

Country, jazz, rock, bluegrass, opera, folk, blues, classical, punk and Philip Glass. All in five days, actually. All of it memorable. And that's why I live here. (Um, the weather helps, I hate the cold, but it's the music, yeah, it's the music.)

LA was crawling with rock and punk bands both local and just-moved-here, from the mid-'60s on, all trying to make it, get played on the radio or at least get a record deal. But they couldn't even get a club gig unless they were a known commodity and they were not, so five new guys in town in three bands got together to form Radio Free Hollywood in 1976 and to make a cool story shorter it worked, it blew the scene off its wheels and through the mid-'80s Hollywood was hoppin' with dozens of the best underground clubs you probably never went to, kid, but I did — Club Lingerie first and foremost, the Central, the Music Machine, Coconut Teazer, the Masque, the Zero, the On Club, Cathay de Grande, Wong's West in SM and Wong's Chinatown, Club 88, Al's Bar, Blackie's, Raji's, even the Whisky and the Starwood started booking different, new acts and everyone was getting signed, getting kinda famous but not getting very rich, which for most was never the goal anyway.

From '81 through the Olympics of 1984 handled all the ads for all the clubs in LA, often working seven days, sometimes 8 a.m. through 4 a.m. My clients, the owners and bookers, were mostly insane. Some criminally insane. But that's a tale for another NOTEWORTHY column. Or maybe a book. Screenplay?

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Meet the Guests at Jason's Party

It could have been a one-man play, with Christopher Dietrick going through the trauma of becoming famous all by himself. He was magnificent. But he was surrounded by 11 other fine actors who helped him along on the road to madness.

"Famous" a new play by Michael Leoni, who also directed it, opens in the Hollywood Hills home of Jason Mast (Dietrick) where a variety of show biz "types" are coming and going. It's an impromptu party to celebrate his nomination for an Academy Award as Best Actor of the year. It's 1994, and Jason is enmeshed in fear, anxiety, and wordless screaming as he thrashes around the living room, running wildly and banging into walls. And all the while he is being harassed by the constant shrill ringing of the telephone.

He is joined by his girlfriend Alyssa (Megan Davis), and together they share drugs, but not sex, as he is too strung out to let anyone touch him. But later in the evening Alyssa engages in a three-way orgy in the upstairs bedroom with Jason's brother Dylan (J. Michael Trautmann) and another of Jason's friends, actor Ryan Logan (Alexander Daly).

Heather Hayes (Decker Sadowski), a popular actress with long blonde hair and a bright red evening dress, arrives with her boyfriend Brody (Thomas McNamara). They are joined by a 16-year-old ingenue named Caley Miller (Jacqi Vene) who is wearing nearly nothing but a bra stuffed with Kleenex, a tiny black skirt, and a loose white fleece jacket that she wears draped around her body like a misplaced boa.

Heather, who had earned her "stardom" on the casting couch of producer Jack Rossi (Gregory DePetro), takes the innocent Caley under her wing to protect her from the rapacious advances of Rossi, but Heather's warning goes unheeded. Caley dances around, posing and attracting attention, and then, excited by the prospect of possibly becoming a protege of Rossi's, playfully pretends to allow him to seduce her. She is undone, however, when the seduction turns to rape.

While all this activity is going on, Jason watches from a big screen near his desk that focuses on each room in the house and captures the "hookups" between the various men and women, men and men, and women

and women.

Continually shooting drugs up his nose, Jason is haunted by memories (hallucinations?) from his past. The "star" of these debilitating memories is himself as a 15-year-old aspiring actor (played beautifully by Derick Breezee). Affable and shy, he endures being bullied by his manager (Rosanna De Candia), his mother (Rachael Meyers), his director (Kenny Johnston, who also doubles as interviewers as Jason's career progresses), and finally Rossi, who constantly reminds him, at the top of his lungs, that "I MADE you!!!"

All the factors involved in becoming a leading man add up to his current state of decrepitude, but Dietrick in portraying the older, addled Jason, gives a performance that would certainly win him a Tony if this play were staged in New York. And, to his credit, Breezee, playing the Young Jason, matches him well. As the two tackle each other and perform as if they were in a ballet, the younger boy badgers his older self for having succumbed to the overpowering intensity and immorality that often accompanies the quest for fame. These periodic pas de deux between the two men were, for me, the high points of the play.

Another high point was the unobtrusive soundtrack by Conner Youngblood that featured nearly three dozen musical pieces quietly attuned to the people and activities onstage. Also noteworthy was the comfortable and practical design of the house created by David Offner.

In the end, a soliloquy by the older Jason harks back to a time when he wanted nothing more than to become an artist and to perfect his art. It was a lost time, he says, when he still believed that "Art comes from the soul."

Measure SM (requiring a supermajority for some development decisions) passed with a 71% "yes" vote, Measure TL (establishing term limits for City Council) passed with 73.6 % of the vote, Measure RR (allowing non-citizens to serve on boards and commissions) had 77.6 % and SMS (\$485 million in school bonds) had 70%.

At the Rent Control Board, newcomer Naomi Sultan was in first place with 14,178 votes (26.50%). Incumbent Nicole Phillis was a close second with 13,884 votes (25.95%) and Incumbent Steve Duron took the remaining seat with 12,029 votes (22.48%). Lori Brown received 9,695 votes (18.12%) and Jon Mann had 3,723 votes (6.96%). Two incumbents were running for three open seats.

Three incumbents were running for four open seats on the SMC Board.

Louise Jaffe had 17,794 votes (23.95%), Nancy Greenstein had 17,653 votes (23.76%), Sion Roy had 16,850 votes (22.68%) Barry Snell had 14,600 votes (19.65%). Roy joins the three incumbents after running for a seat in 2016 and years of participation with the local Democratic Club. Patrick Acosta II was fourth with 7,389 votes (9.95%)

All four incumbents were returned to the School Board.





people notice marijuana smoke in public, if it bothers them, if it's harmful, and what should be done to solve smoke in public," said Sarah Blanch, Regional Director of The Westside Impact Project, which operates under the County.

Data gathered from the surveys will be available in 4-6 months. The data will be used to develop and possibly implement initiatives to prevent or reduce marijuana smoke in public/shared spaces.

At the Venice skate park, officials attempted

to gain a consensus about marijuana. The consensus gathered thus far? Who cares.

SAPC officials said they hadn't received a "No" in terms of people noticing smoke, with most being unbothered by it.

"It actually makes things smell better," recent transplant Domonique Jones said. "There's a lot more [urine] on the ground around here than weed smoke in the air, so I'll take the weed smoke over a lot of other smells."

Jones added that he's been a recreational marijuana smoker since for decades, laughing off negative perceptions of the drug.

"It's not a big deal at all. You can't get hooked on weed and it's not a gateway drug. I've been smoking since 8th grade and never tried anything else."

A family visiting Venice from Bakersfield had stronger opinions.

Eddie and Brianna Monje were traveling with their daughter after a check-up at UCLA's children hospital. The presence of marijuana was alienating for the couple.

"We can smell it around but we haven't been bugged by physical smoke," Brianna Monje said. But the smell alone bugs me because my child is with me."

Her husband, Eddie, says he feels Prop. 64 makes younger generations feel that marijuana smoking is okay, which he doesn't agree with.

"We grew up being taught this stuff is

bad," he said. "My daughter is 7, I don't want her exposed to this so young."

Businesses along Venice were asked about their feelings regarding smoking and if it affected their customers or foot

Businesses questioned refused to go on record but said the presence of marijuana hasn't been a concern for them or customers, some joking that stoned customers have actually improved business.

"It's definitely increased sales and foot traffic here," a manager of local eatery said with a laugh. "It's Los Angeles, people are used to it."

Still, a few neighbors said at the ARB meeting they are worried sound will carry from the decks and think the modifications to the plan do not fully address their privacy concerns. Board members asked Sewell to enclose or plant around the carport deck to minimize its impact on neighbors, among other conditions.

The ARB also approved a three-story

building containing 50 apartments and commercial space at 2822 Santa Monica Boulevard, which is currently occupied by a single-story strip mall. The ground floor of the building will house cafes, shops and restaurants with outdoor seating underneath an arcade of angled white columns. Corrugated metal and recessed balconies highlighted in bright orange and green form the facade.

Board members praised the design of the project and made only a few recommendations about lighting and landscaping before approving it. They were more critical of a proposed renovation of a one-story building at 1501 Broadway, which would convert the building into a creative office and a cafe, and asked the architect to simplify the design before returning to the ARB for approval.

Board members also made several conditions to an update to two adjoining apartments at 1433-37 Euclid Street, which contain 11 units and have not been renovated since they were built in 1962. The renderings of the development show two

symmetrical buildings facing each other over a central courtyard accessed through a gate.

The board asked the applicant to make the design of the entry softer and more appealing by making the gate more transparent and adding landscaping. It also recommended providing additional acoustic insulation to the building because it is located near a school

Democrats make US House gains in California

Democrat Mike Levin on Wednesday captured the Southern California U.S. House seat held for years by retiring Republican Rep. Darrell Issa, while GOP Rep. Steve Knight conceded his Los Angeles-area seat to a Democratic newcomer, 31-year-old Katie Hill.

In San Diego County, Republican Rep. Duncan Hunter survived the election despite facing corruption charges. A 60-count federal grand jury indictment against him and his wife alleges the couple illegally used \$250,000 in campaign funds for vacations, meals and other personal expenses.

Levin's victory carries symbolic weight because of Issa's nearly two-decade tenure, during which he was a chief antagonist of President Barack Obama. The 49th District is partly in the one-time GOP stronghold of Orange County. The rest is in San Diego

Levin, an environmental attorney, had about 54 percent of nearly 177,000 votes counted so far.

He sparred with Republican rival Diane Harkey over President Donald Trump's agenda, global warming and immigration. Harkey, a former state lawmaker, had been endorsed by the president.

"I don't think that the traditional Orange County Republican embraces Trumpism," Levin told The Associated Press. He said voters in the district are concerned with coastal protection and climate change.

Issa's district was among seven in the state that were carried by Hillary Clinton in the 2016 presidential election. Democrats saw all as potential pickups this November.

The battlegrounds range from Central Valley farmland to legendary surfing spots in Orange County and Knight's 25th District, which cuts through suburbs, horse ranches and high desert in northern Los Angeles County and a small slice of Ventura County.

Knight trailed Hill by 2.5 points with about 163,000 votes counted and thousands more left to be tallied. The Associated Press has not called the race.

Knight, a former police officer, offered Hill his congratulations and said he was proud of his work on veterans' health care, small business development and defense

"Our electoral process is integral to our identity as a free and fair society, and the voters have spoken," he said.

Hill stressed her centrist politics: She's a gun owner and her Republican father is a police officer who had never voted for a Democrat before her primary. Her mother, a Democrat, is a nurse.

"I look forward to working on behalf of everyone in this district to ensure we all have access to quality health care, housing we can afford, and a representative and transparent government which truly serves the people," she said.

Republican Reps. Mimi Walters and Dana Rohrabacher were fighting for their political

lives in two Orange County districts they easily won two years ago.

In the 45th District, which has a 7-point GOP registration edge, Walters was leading law professor Katie Porter, a protégé of Massachusetts Democratic Sen. Elizabeth Warren, by about 3 points with 184,000 votes counted.

Porter had campaigned on overturning Trump's tax reform package and her support for universal health care.

Rohrabacher, known as Russia's leading defender on Capitol Hill, was in a tough race with Republican-turned-Democrat Harley Rouda in the 48th District, where the GOP has a 10-point registration edge.

Rouda, a real estate executive, has depicted the 15-term congressman as the face of Washington gridlock. He was leading with 51 percent of the vote, with about 181,000 counted.

In retiring GOP Rep. Ed Royce's 39th District that includes part of Orange County, Republican Young Kim held a 3-point edge over Democrat Gil Cisneros, with about 150,000 votes counted. If elected, Kim would become the first Korean-American immigrant woman elected to the House.

The former state legislator worked for Royce for years and has positioned herself as a Trump supporter with an independent streak.

Cisneros, a first-time candidate who won a \$266 million lottery jackpot, was looking for a big turnout from Hispanics who make up about a third of the population. Two other targeted Republicans, Reps. David Valadao and Jeff Denham, represent farm-belt districts where Democrats have more registered voters but are more moderate than in urban areas.

Valadao's 21st District includes parts of Fresno, Kern, Kings and Tulare counties. He won by a wide margin in 2016 and on Tuesday held off a challenge by Democrat T.J. Cox.

Cox tried to make the race a referendum on Valadao's support for President Donald Trump. In a tip to the district's heavy Hispanic population, Valadao touted his support for a way to keep in the country people who came as children when their parents illegally entered.

In the 10th District, anchored in Modesto, Denham was leading Democrat Josh Harder by about 1,300 votes point with 112,000 votes counted.

Harder argued that Republican policies in Washington have hurt many residents. He emphasized that Denham voted to repeal the Affordable Care Act, which Harder supports.

Denham, known for his involvement in water issues vital to agriculture, has proven tough to beat, despite the Democratic registration edge. He won by 3 percentage points in 2016.

Representing a district with a large Hispanic population, Denham has pushed for Congress to consider a pathway for citizenship for hundreds of thousands of immigrants who came to the U.S. as children and stayed here illegally.

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
